This workshop is intended as an incubator for an African Antarctic humanities and arts community. We are happy to welcome those who are already working on these topics, while also hopefully stimulating new interest in those who aren't (yet) doing so – in Antarctica, the islands, the Southern Ocean, and our south-facing coastlines more generally in a time of melting ice and rising seas.

This workshop is an experiment in bringing scientific knowledge into conversation with artistic and literary engagements with the region, within our unique historical and political context. We hope that you will enter into the spirit of creative and future-oriented thinking, as we shape this new terrain together.

We also hope that the conference location itself will become a part of our conversations. Cape Agulhas, located at the southernmost tip of mainland Africa and designated the official meeting point of the Atlantic and Indian Oceans, should be a generative space from which to explore the interrelationship between Africa and Antarctica.

For those driving: there is no need to stop at reception once you get to the ANP – we have submitted your SANParks forms, and collected the keys and access cards. Please drive straight to the Agulhas Rest Camp. We will all meet at the **Lagoon House at 13.00** for a welcome lunch.

From the park entrance: drive past the Cape Agulhas lighthouse towards Suiderstrand >>> past the Meisho Maru shipwreck >>> through Suiderstrand >>> turn left at the T-junction >>> Adrienne will open the gate (please phone her when entering the park)







## **Presentations | Internet**

We will have a laptop, projector, screen and speakers available for all the presentations (not quite as analogue anymore!). If your presentation uses an uncommon filetype, please let us know ahead of time so that we can ensure that we will be able to open it. To help us stay on schedule, please send your presentation to us ahead of time or give it to us before the start of your session – this will allow us to do a quick test drive.

We will set up a 4G router to serve as a wireless access point in the Lagoon House, but please note that mobile and data signals in the ANP are patchy. If you will need internet access for your presentation, please create screen recordings or screenshots as backups.
