You will remember that at the informal conference held last summer to discuss questions arising out of the International Whaling Agreement, it was decided that the prohibition on the catching of humpback whales should be extended for a further year by means of an additional protocol to the Agreement. In present circumstances, of course, it is impossible to adopt this procedure; but His Majesty's Government feel that it is none the less desirable that the prohibition should be observed during this season, and, as I think you know, this view is also held by the Norwegian Government. I have therefore been asked to suggest that the governments of countries from which expeditions are actually proceeding to the whaling grounds for this season, viz. Japan, the United States of America and South Africa, as well as this country and Norway, should come to an informal understanding to instruct these expeditions to refrain from catching humpbacks. His Majesty's Government, for their part, are prepared to issue such instructions to British expeditions if similar instructions are issued by the other governments concerned; and I shall be glad to learn whether similar instructions will be issued by the Japanese Government on the same condition.

I venture to take this opportunity to mention another matter connected with the Whaling Agreement. As you know, the British expeditions sent out this year have been prevented by the circumstances prevailing at the outbreak of war from arriving at the whaling grounds on time; and, though we have tried to secure an amendment of the Agreement

The Japanese interests concerned shall, therefore, strictly observe the stipulations in the existing Conventions in the present sesson.

We have, from time to time, corresponded with the High Commissioner's Office on the subject of the International Whaling Agreement 1937 and Protocol 1938, particularly with regard to the question of the ratification of the Agreement by the Union of South Africe

We appreciate, of course, the constitutional and other difficulties which have hitherto stood in the way of such ratification, but we gather that a Bill was to have been introduced into the Parliament of the Union of South Africa during this session, which, if passed, would have enabled the South African Government to proceed with the ratification.

As you no doubt know, the Japanese Government recently announced, through their Ambassador in London, their intention to postpone their formal adhesion to the Whaling Agreement and Protocol "until normal conditions regarding international whaling shall again prevail", but, at the same time, they have given a general undertaking that they will abide by the terms of the Agreement, and have issued instructions to Japanese whaling expeditions in terms of the enclosed translation.

Although there has been general disappointment over the decision of the Japanese Government, their expressed intention to observe the spirit of the Agreement and Protocol has been welcomed. In this connection it would give great satisfaction were the Union Government to find themselves in a position to proceed with the ratification of the Agreement and Protocol at an early date, as this would undoubtedly make it easier

In this connection, it would give great satisfaction were the Union Covernment to find themselves in a position to proceed with the ratification of the Agreement and Protocol at an early date, as this would undoubtedly make it easier ultimately to bring in Japan. We shall accordingly be grateful for any information you may have, or may receive, as to the passage of the proposed legislation.

We have, from time to time, corresponded with the High Commissioner's Office on the subject of the International Whaling Agreement 1937 and Protocol 1938, particularly with regard to the question of the ratification of the Agreement by the Union of South Africa.

Your despatch of the 3rd July, P.H.107/5. United Kingdom Government understand that two British whaling expeditions proceeding to the Anteretic next Autumn and believe two Norwegian expeditions also, No information of the intentions of other countries except to assume that Japan will send an expedition and the United States of America possibly one. While Japan postponed ratification of the International Agreement until the end of the war, the United Kingdom Government hope that Japan will adhere as before, to the main provisions of the Agreement. In view of the unwillingness of Norway and the United States of imerica to countenence any departure from the strict terms of the Agreement, no doubt they will abide by the Agreement which course the United Kingdom Government state it should obviously also follow, and eccordingly hope that the non-taking of humpback whales which at the 1939 Conference was proposed to be continued until September 30th, 1940, should now be further continued until September 30th, The United Kingdom Government have now asked the United States of America, Japan and Morway to instruct their expeditions to refrain from taking humpback whales during the ensuing season and to enquire whether the Union Government are prepared to take similar action.
